April 27 - A series of tornadoes ravage Missouri, Alabama, Georgia, and South Carolina. Many were left homeless, and some, without their loved ones. The death toll reached about 340 .
May 8- The Mississippi River crested and rushed downstream toward Louisiana due to storms. Neighborhoods of Memphis, Tennessee are submerged and many communities along the river are being evacuated due to record flooding.


April 29- The last shuttle launch of Endeavour was scheduled on this date, though complications with technical equipment delayed the launch until May 16. What will NASA use after the last shuttle launch? Dr. Longsdon, a member of the NASA Advisory Council Exploration Committee, talks about using a space taxi that will be a capsule that will only transport about 6-7 crew members to the space station.
May 16- Endeavor launches and on
May 18 docks on the International Space Station

April 29- Prince William and Catherine Middleton tie the knot at Westminster Abbey in England. The newlywed royal couple went to the Buckingham Palace afterwards. They headed out into the balcony, in front of thousands of spectators and kissed. This is something Princess Diana and Prince Charles had also done at their royal wedding in July 1981.


May 1- Osama bin Laden is killed by thirty to forty U.S Navy SEAL operatives at a compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan. The operation was completed in less than forty minutes; though most of the time was spent scavenging for vital information or leads about Al Qaeda plans.

April \& May- Fall out of Govenor Tom Corbitt's proposed budget cuts in Pennsylvania schools takes toll on all public schools and state related universities. The budget allows for school choice vouchers and asking districts to negotiate with teachers to accept pay freezes. Many schools, including Hanover, are furloughing and/or demoting teachers to help with the budget crisis. Some districts are having to consider cuts to art, music, driver's education, physical education and colleges are looking at raising tuitions. Penn State officials said that the cuts are "devastating" and would mean "catastrophic change for students and the state."

## Mission Possible 2011




On Friday, April 29th, 2011, billions of people around the world tuned in to watch the newest chapter of the royal fairytale unfold. Prince William Arthur Phillip Louis and his girlfriend of several years, Catherine Elizabeth Middleton- better known as simply "Kate," were wed at eleven o'clock in the morning at Westminster Abbey in London, England- the same venue where they had lied William's mother Princess Diana to rest fourteen years earlier; Prince William's way of keeping his mother close to it all.

The bride-to-be arrived in style. The dress, designed by English designer Sarah Burton was complete with lace sleeves with a plunging neckline and full veil.

The veil was held in place by a Cartier Scroll Tiara, made in 1936 and lent to Kate by the Queen. For the customary bridal themes of "Something old, something new, something borrowed, and something blue," Middleton's gown had traditional lace appointments (the "old"), diamond earrings given to her by her parents (the "new"), the Queen's tiara (the "borrowed"), and a ribbon sewn into the bodice (the "blue"). The shoes were also from Alexander McQueen and had a lace pattern matching the dress with appliqués made by the Royal School of Needlework.
"Wait until you see her," Prince Harry, William's brother and best man, remarked as he smiled and watched Kate make her way down the aisle. "What a cutie."

It is customary for the groom to be the very last person to see the bride, so William was not permitted to turn around to watch Kate make her way down the aisle.

Kate's bouquet contained Myrtle, Lily of the Valley, Sweet William and Hyacinth.

The order of service chosen by the bridal couple was the Series One form which is virtually identical with that of the 1928 Prayer Book.

The Dean of Westminster, John Hall, officiated for most of the service, with Rowan Williams, the Archbishop of Canterbury, celebrating the wedding itself;

Prince William looked just as great for the occasion; fully dressed in his military uniform. William could have chosen to wear the uniform of any of the junior officer ranks. However, as he had been appointed colonel of the Irish Guards on the tenth February 2011, he instead chose to wear the full dress uniform of


Richard Chartres, the Bishop of London, preached the sermon.

It has long been traditional for the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Church of England's most senior bishop, to officiate at the weddings of England's monarchs and future monarchs. Char-
 friend of the Prince of tres is a close friend of the Prince
Wales and confirmed both Prince William and Kate Middleton.

The service commenced with the procession of the Queen, Prince Philip, and the clergy. Shortly after, Kate Middleton arrived with the party of matron of honor and junior attendants. As the choir sang an anthem by Sir Hubert Parry, the bride made her three-and-a-half minute procession through the nave and quire on her father's arm, to meet Prince William. The service proceeded with the formal service and congregational singing of three well known hymns, fanfares, anthems, organ and orchestral music.

In the marriage vows, the couple promised to "love, comfort, honor and keep" each other. This was sealed by the exchange of a single ring. The ring is made from Welsh gold and was created by the royal warrant holder Wartski, a company with roots in Bangor, Gwynedd, and north Wales. Since 1923, it has been a tradition in the royal fam-
ily to use Welsh gold for the wedding ring of the bride. Prince William chose not to receive a wedding ring at the ceremony.

The lesson, read by the bride's brother, James Middleton, was from the New Testament's Epistle to the Romans and is an exhortation to live a righteous and peaceful life. The sermon, preached by the Bishop of London, commenced with a quotation from Catherine of Siena whose feast day it was. The bishop urged the couple to live selflessly, each remembering the needs of each other and seeking to transform each other by love rather than seeking to reform. He ended the sermon with a prayer composed by the couple themselves:
"God our Father, we thank you for our families; for the love that we share and for the joy of our marriage In the busyness of each day keep our eyes fixed on what is real and important in life and help us to be generous with our time and love and energy Strengthened by our union help us to serve and comfort those who suffer. We ask this in the Spirit of Jesus Christ. Amen."

On the morning of the wedding, William became the Duke of Cambridge, Earl of Strathearn and Baron Carrickfergus, with Kate becoming Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cambridge after the wed-
ding.) The titles also have symbolic meanings-Strathearn is close to St Andrews, Fife, in Scotland, where the couple met as students, and Carrickfergus in Northern Ireland. Combined with his existing link with Wales and his becoming Duke of Cambridge in England, William's collective titles link him to each of the four countries in the UK.

The Queen hosted a lunchtime reception at Buckingham Palace, starting after the arrival of the carriage with the married couple. It was a private gathering for guests drawn from the congregation who represent the couple's official and private lives.

The wedding cake had a strong British floral theme, and was an eighttiered traditional fruit cake decorated with cream and white icing and 900 sugar paste flowers. The cake designer Fiona Cairns was chosen in February 2011 to create the wedding cake. Additionally, McVitie's created a groom's cake from chocolate biscuit for the reception at Buckingham Palace. The chocolate biscuit cake was made from a Royal Family recipe and was specially requested by Prince William.

After the reception, William drove his new bride out of the palace for the short distance to Clarence House, his official London residence. The car, a blue Aston Martin DB6 Volante, had been decorated in the customary 'newly wed' style by the best man and friends;
the license plate read

The Prince had changed
into a Blues and Royals Captain's frock coat also designed by Kashket; his wife was still wearing her wedding dress. In the evening, the Prince of Wales gave a private dinner, followed by dancing, at Buckingham Palace for the couple and their close friends and family.


The two are set to honeymoon for two weeks. One of which will be spent in the country of Jordan, touring some of the most famous sites- such as the ancient city of Petra and the Wadi Rum desert Valley. The other week may be what is known as a "stay-cation" and will possibly be on one of the royal estates, perhaps Balmoral in Scotland.
